

## Student Admissions, Outcomes, and Other Data

Consistent with American Psychological Association (APA) accreditation regulations, the following information is provided to inform the public and prospective applicants about the Iowa State University accredited Ph.D. program in Counseling Psychology.

### Assistantship and Fellowship Support

All psychology department doctoral students (counseling psychology, social, and cognitive) who are admitted to doctoral studies receive assistantship support and are considered "in-state". All are full-time students. The standard support package requires 20 hours per week of work for the nine-month academic year. Over the last ten years all Counseling Psychology students in good standing have been supported every year that they were on campus. Additional funding sources, accorded on a competitive basis, include the Miller Fellowship (approximately \$5,000 per academic year beyond the standard assistantship package-guaranteed for four years) and the Gaskill Fellowship (approximately \$2,800 of summer support for the first year), the Bath Fellowship (approximately \$1,500 of summer support), the Graduate Minority Assistance Program (up to \$9,000 assistantship support guaranteed for 5 years), the George Washington Carver Fellowship (up to \$25,000 per year fellowship guaranteed for three years available to minority students and funded through the Graduate College), and the Alliance for Graduate Education and the Professoriate (AGEP) Fellowship (up to \$25,000 per year fellowship guaranteed for five years available to ethnic/racial minority students and funded through the Graduate College).
